



2023 Post Event Report



The vision of the Bermuda Underwater Exploration Institute (BUEI) is to 'Ensure the ocean around Bermuda is widely understood, appreciated and protected', and the organization has been committed to developing ocean literacy through its educational programmes since its inception nearly 25 years ago.

With the global attention on the health of the world's oceans, and the direct impact to Bermuda from rising sea levels attributed to global warming, BUEI sought to adopt a holistic approach to further increase ocean literacy and to promote ocean stewardship.

The Youth Climate Summit (YCS) was created by BUEI in 2021 to educate, inform, and engage young people, aged 13-22, on the climate issue. YCS provides an ideal opportunity to involve multiple generations and stakeholders in discussions and collaboration on the broader environmental issues that ultimately impact ocean ecosystems, locally and globally. It also lays the foundation for a year of youth-led initiatives in Bermuda intended to safeguard those ecosystems.

Overview

BUEI's 3rd Youth Climate Summit, was held over six days from November 10-18, 2023. Each year brings a new cohort of first-time participants as well as returning participants. The latter includes a growing body of YCS Alumni, defined as those who have actively taken part in student-led initiatives during the year inbetween Summits.



This year, we incorporated changes in response to feedback from educators and partners, and to ensure equitable access throughout the event for all students. Virtual sessions were held over three days instead of four, enabling both onsite days to take place during the school week. Keeping all sessions during school hours, vs. on a Saturday, aided student retention. Saturday was dedicated to a climate action project at Coopers Island Nature Reserve, but it was postponed due to weather conditions.

While this report provides impact data across many touchpoints, one unexpected outcome deserves special attention. Despite an unforeseen closure of public schools on Day 1 for a Professional Development Day (PD), impacted students showed remarkable determination to fully participate. A total of 40 students overcame this unexpected barrier to participate in the mandatory first session: 26 without internet access came onsite to BUEI, while the others watched a recording online and completed an assignment before returning to school after the holiday weekend for Day 2. Additionally, several educators attended the same Day 1 session for their PD, and BUEI's Education Team held PD sessions for middle school science teachers later that afternoon.

The significant resolve shown by a quarter of those registered puts the registration data shown in the table on page 7 of this report into context and underscores their expressed desire to learn more about this topic alongside their peers. The added involvement of Educators through the PD sessions was also a welcome outcome. As reflected by the exclusive partner sessions held during the Environmental Showcase, engaging adults in the same processes as students fuels a circular learning environment that's beneficial for all.

Dr. Morris is a Professor of Chemistry and Environmental Sciences, and the Director of the School of Mathematical and Natural Sciences in the New College of Interdisciplinary arts and Sciences, at Arizona State University.

Passionate about broadening the participation of underrepresented groups in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), Dr. Morris has guided the research for more than 200 students at the graduate, undergraduate, and high school levels. His successful hands-on outreach programs and informal science education/exposure projects have reached over 50,000 students worldwide. Among his most notable outreach programmes are a network of high school weather camps that provided nearly 800 students from underserved populations into career opportunities in atmospheric sciences and a series of "Community Science Fests". The latter being a model for bringing science to communities or subpopulations that are not traditionally exposed to such prospects.

As STEM fields represent one of the largest growth sectors of the global economy, exposure and strong academic preparation in these disciplines will allow more Bermudians to confidently engage in addressing the country's most pressing challenges while directly building advocacy for those that are most impacted.




Highlighting STEM



























Friday, November 17th Purpose: Your Turn Your Voice!

Jevanic Henry, 26, a climate activist and development professional from the Caribbean Island of Saint Lucia, was appointed to the second cohort of the Youth Advisory Group on Climate Change by The United Nations Secretary-General, António Guterres, on 16 March 2023. The group of seven young leaders brings diversity of experiences, backgrounds, and areas of climate expertise to assist in collaborating with global youth climate movements to bring young people's perspectives and solutions to the Secretary-General and major climate decision-making meetings. In 2021, Jevanic was selected as a United Nations Foundation Next Generation ellow, tasked by the Secretary-General with implementing a process that allowed young people to help shape the future. The Fellows consulted with and collated the proposals of hundreds of young people from around the world into the Our Future Agenda report. Many of these ideas went on to be included in the Secretary-General's

Our Common Agenda report - which looks ahead to the next 25 years and represents his vision on the future of global cooperation. In 2020, he served on Restless Development's first ever Youth Power Panel, comprising 12 young leaders from across the world championing youth-led action towards attainment of the global goals.

Ela is an advocate for ocean-based climate solutions and has represented numerous organizations at various United Nations Climate Change (UNFCCC) negotiations and conferences. Her latest venture, Bloom, is a clean-tech startup which specializes in small-scale algal mitigation systems for the coastal villages of Turkey. Bloom currently has a functional prototype is and spearheading research on a global scale regarding algal nucilage conversion and the connection with global biodiversity credits and blue (ocean) credits. Bloom has won first place at the Monaco Ocean Protection Challenge and awarded Ela as the "European Entrepreneur of the Year* at the 2023 YouthStart Entrepreneurship Competition. She serves as a member of EarthEcho International's Youth Council and as the Director of Finance for the youth-led climate organization Zero Hour. Representing

Turkey on the Sustainable Ocean Alliance's Youth Policy Advisory Council, Ela seeks to elevate the voices of marginalized coastal communities on a large scale through business, economics, and advocacy

interconnectedness between ocean health and human health. As the founder of Inner Light, co-creator of @oceanuprise, co-founder of Sea Dragon Studios - One World Breath, co-winner of the UN Oceans Conference Youth & Innovation Forum, and United Nations esteemed young leader, Bodhi supports young people to create impact at scale. He is a Youth Advisor for OnDeck isheries AI, World Ocean Day, and Break Free from Plastic Pollution. He is actively working on a Meaningful Youth Ocean-Climate Action strategy with various UN constituencies, UN Global Compact and youth partners. He is a second-year student in the BA + Masters of Management program at the University of British Columbia

studying oceans, climate action, and business. Bodhi has been featured by the United Nations, Forbes. Economist Impact. Wildlife Conservation Society, Oceanic Global, and has presented to world leaders at over 10 global climate conferences.


Working together in groups and being able to discuss our ideas with other people who have similar wants for us (for the planet/earth and our communities)

I chose to do it because I wanted to learn more about sustainability and see how many young people are passionate about the environment and how that the climate changing is a big problem.




What element of the event did you like most?


